

COMPARING LEGAL DOCUMENT ASSISTANTS AND PARALEGALS

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This guide will help to clarify the differences between registered and bonded Legal Document Assistants and Paralegals. We have tried to address many of the most common misconceptions people have about these two distinctly different professions, and their functions in dealing with consumers and/or attorneys.

LEGAL DOCUMENT ASSISTANTS

A Legal Document Assistant (LDA) is an experienced professional who is authorized under California law to assist the public in preparing legal documents for consumers. However, an LDA is not an attorney, and cannot provide legal advice, or represent individuals in court.

LDA's have similar educational background as a paralegal, and are required by law to be registered and bonded in the county in which they have their principal place of business. (Business & Professions Code, Section 6400, et. seq.). The registration is valid for two years, at which time it must be renewed. In the past, individuals who assisted the public in completing legal documents were permitted to call themselves Independent Paralegals. Effective January 1, 2004, Business and Professions Code Section 6450 redefined "paralegal" to mean only those persons who work for, and are supervised by, attorneys. Excluded from that definition are LDA's. LDA's are prohibited from calling themselves paralegals.

The LDA statute requires LDA's to maintain a bond, and to be registered, in order to offer document preparation services to the public. Paralegals are not required to register, as they work only for attorneys, and not for consumers.

WHAT CAN A LEGAL DOCUMENT ASSISTANT DO?

At your direction, LDA's can complete court forms for you, helping you to avoid pitfalls, and to make sure that every important detail on a form is accounted for. LDA's may also file the forms with the court, and serve them on the appropriate parties. LDA's may also, supply books and publications authored, written, or approved by attorneys, which you may use to help you with your matter.

WHAT CAN'T A LEGAL DOCUMENT ASSISTANT DO?

- Cannot represent you in court
- Cannot give you legal advice
- Cannot tell you what information should be inserted in the documents
- Cannot interpret documents

HOW TO FIND A LEGAL DOCUMENT ASSISTANT?

- Contact the county clerk or county recorder for a list of the registered LDA's in your county.
- Look in the telephone directory under "Legal Document Assistants."
- Contact your local Referral Service of your County Bar Association.
- Get referrals from friends or relatives.
- Check the California Association of Legal Document Assistants' online member locator to find an LDA CALDA member in your area at http://www.calda.org/Search.asp

WHAT DO I NEED TO KNOW BEFORE HIRING A LEGAL DOCUMENT ASSISTANT?

- Find out if the LDA is registered and bonded.
- Ask to see their county registration card.
- Ask if you are going to be provided with a written contract, which clearly states the work to be performed and the cost for the work. A Contract for Services is required to be executed by both parties (you and the LDA) under California state law. You have the right to contact an attorney for legal advice.
- Even if you have hired an LDA you still have the right to seek legal advice from an attorney.
- If you do not understand your legal rights, or need advice on your legal matter, consult an attorney before you direct the LDA to complete your documents.

PARALEGALS

A paralegal, also known as a legal assistant, is a professional who is qualified by education and training to assist attorneys in providing legal services. Paralegals do not work independently for consumers. Instead, they are employed by, or contract with, attorneys. Paralegals are regulated by Business & Professions Code, Section 6450.

WHAT CAN A PARALEGAL DO?

A paralegal assists attorneys in preparation of legal documents, gathering facts, performing research, interviewing witnesses, and other tasks at the direction of an attorney.

WHAT CAN'T PARALEGALS DO?

- Cannot set or accept fees for services from a consumer
- Cannot independently prepare documents for consumers
- Cannot represent you in court.

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- Cannot give you legal advice.
- Cannot work as LDA's, unless meeting the requirements of being bonded and registered.
